### From Fr. David...

### Salt

The nineteenth century Scottish chemist Sir Lyon Playfair argued, on scientific grounds that under the generic name of "salt" in certain passages of the bible we are to understand petroleum or its residue asphalt instead of common salt. Thus in Genesis 19:26 when Lot's wife looks back and was turned into a pillar of salt, it should read "pillar of asphalt". Part of the logic is that as salt is soluble in water, after a few rainstorms the pillar would have been washed away if it was just salt, but as asphalt it would remain. And again in our passage today instead of salt we should read "petroleum," as unlike salt that can be exposed to the air and still remain unchanged, petroleum loses its essence by exposure and becomes asphalt, from which pavements are made, that is, it is only good to be "thrown out and trampled underfoot." (5:13). Not surprisingly few scripture scholars agree with him, but "You are the petroleum of the earth" does go well with "You are the light of the world"!

On the other hand John J. Pilch is a biblical scholar currently working at Georgetown University in the USA; he tells us that in the Middle East the common fuel for clay-ovens was something that was more plentiful than wood: camel or donkey dung. One of the duties each young girl had to learn was to collect the dung and mould it into patties to be left in the sun to dry. Then a slab of salt was placed at the base of the oven and upon it the dung patty. John J. Pilch tells us that salt has catalytic properties which cause the dung to burn but eventually the salt slabs lose their catalytic ability and becomes useless. Or as Jesus says, "It is good for nothing but to be thrown outside where it can still provide a sure footing in a muddy road." He goes on to say that in both Aramaic and Hebrew – the languages that Jesus would have used – the words "clay-oven" and "earth" are the same. Thus to be salt for the earth is to start fires and make things burn. If Jesus'

disciples do this, they will also be "light of the earth." He concludes that the two images of salt and light are masterfully joined showing Jesus to be a clever and imaginative teacher.

What we do know is that St. Paul referred to salt in his letter to the Colossians: "Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer everyone." (4:6)
