A number of people have mentioned to me that their grown-up kids, who perhaps are not that close to the Church, have found the media reports particularly difficult and they have reacted by distancing themselves even further from the Church. Really, this is understandable in some ways, and it is a reminder of what a long journey we have to travel to rebuild our place in the society. Remember that here in B.C. the Provincial Health officials closed the churches for month after month after month while leaving pubs open. We have a lot of work to do.

I was up at 5am again this morning (Friday) because back in my home diocese of Plymouth, England, we had an ordination. A young man called Albert was ordained a priest. Obviously it is wonderful to have another priest in the diocese, and a young priest at that, but Albert brings more than just a newly ordained pair of hands to our diocese. Having been through university and then studied in Rome for six years, he is a very intelligent young man, but really it is his faith that is the important part. In an interview on YouTube Albert talks about himself and his path to priesthood. He said that the starting point for his journey to ordination was when "I realised that Jesus really loved me, just as I was; that He wanted to share His live with me, and to help me through the ups and downs of my own life."

I thought it was really wonderful that his vocation wasn't based upon "I want to be a priest", but rather, "I realised that Jesus really loved me"! For that is the starting point for all of us on our journey through Christian life.

Last year when describing his time at seminary [priests' training college], he said,

"In a nutshell, it involves placing yourself under the loving gaze of God and allowing Him to mould you into yourself. It involves great joy, because you learn that you are loved, but also sadness, because you realise how difficult it is to love as God loves. I have had to face much about myself that I struggle with, and also to learn how to see others through God's eyes. Most importantly, in order to say 'yes' to what God is asking of me, I have had to learn that He is asking me, with all my strengths, but also my weaknesses, to be His priest. And He asks this of me simply because He loves me. It is an acceptance, not of a job, but of a gift".

I found these words uplifting and refreshing. We do congratulate Fr. Albert and rejoice with his family and with the Plymouth Diocese. And if you want to see the
