


# First Holy Communion

Congratulations to the y o u n g s t e r s i n Sparwood who will


be receiving their First Holy Communion this Sunday morning – and to Nick who received it last Sunday. Those joining us on-line will be able to be part of this celebration via Zoom.

## **Bishop Mark O'Toole** – Fr. David's Bishop in England

Many of you are familiar with Bishop Mark from his messages and videos to us; the big news this week is that Bishop Mark is to become an Archbishop.

Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Mark to be the next Archbishop of the Cardiff Diocese and also the next Bishop of the diocese of Menevia, so effectively he will cover the whole of the southern half of Wales (with a little bit of England). This is exciting news, but it comes with mixed emotions. Thus while I am pleased for Bp. Mark and for Wales, I personally am very sad to be losing the faith-filled and fatherly leadership that Bp. Mark has provided over the last nine years.

Bishop Mark will be installed as Archbishop on 20th June, but effectively his role as Bishop of Plymouth has now ended as almost all his time will be taken up with preparing for his new ministry. This means that in the Plymouth Diocese we will have to wait for the appointment of a new Bishop. Sometimes this happens fairly quickly, but at the moment as Plymouth diocese is functioning effectively and there is no particular crisis, it could take six months, a year or even longer. Be sure that I will let you know if there is any news. In the meantime, please remember Bp. Mark in your prayers, and also please pray for the Diocese of Plymouth and whoever will be appointed as our next leader.

"I express my heartfelt gratitude to all in the Diocese of Plymouth. You have taught me what it is to be a bishop. I will leave with many happy memories, and with sadness too, in saying farewell to good friends. Thank you for the love you have shown me these past eight years. It strengthens me as I face this new opportunity, and I am sure you will be praying for me.

When I first became bishop, I chose the motto, "Into your hands, Lord". It is a prayer I have had cause to make many times in recent days... For it is in the Lord, as His missionary disciples, that we find our deepest identity. It is for Him that we set out afresh, to deepen our love for Him, and to bring others to Him." One of the priests of our diocese said that a bishop was a bit like a pair of boots: they need to be broken in because at first they can rub a bit, but then over time they become more comfortable and as they grow older you really don't want to change them.

## Waiting Room:


