Obviously the news of the death of the Queen has overshadowed today (Thursday), and as the full meaning of this news slowly sinks in, it will be on the minds of many for some time. We have obviously known that this news was coming at some point, but honestly I still can't believe it. Like many of you, I have lived all my life with the Queen as the head of state, so I have not known the 'institution' of the monarch in any form other than Queen Elizabeth.

This afternoon my Dad gave me a lesson on how to sing "God Save the King". When Dad first joined the Royal Air Force, George VI was on the throne, so Dad has sung "God Save the King" many times on parade. He also was telling me of his memories of King George VI's death; a little glimpse into a bit of history.

Our task now is to hold our new head of state in our prayers. While I wonder if I will ever get used to calling Prince Charles, 'King Charles', I recognise that all his life he as worked very closely with the Queen, so with her death he not only loses his mother, but also his mentor and guide. So we pray that he will have a chance to grieve, that he will receive comfort and support at this time, and as he takes up his new role, that he will be open to God in the same way as the Queen always was.

But before we leave the Queen, I will print on the last page of this e-mail a prayer that I think is particularly beautiful. It comes from the Church of Scotland.

Masses this Weekend – Theme: Lost are Found

At the Sunday Masses this weekend I am going to use one of the Eucharistic Prayers for Reconciliation, as these are beautiful prayers and fit in so well with the readings. And while the death of the Queen might be on our minds, I feel that these Eucharistic prayers really encourage and lift our spirits.

In case you don't know, as well as the four Eucharistic Prayers we commonly use, there are also two for Reconciliation, two for use with Children, and one "for various needs", making nine in total. The theologian Fr. Edward McNamara has written that we should not think of these as nine different Eucharistic Prayers, but nine "versions of a single prayer that accentuate different themes."

The gospel this weekend is quite long and consists of three separate though very connected parables. These parables are, the parable of the lost sheep, the parable of the lost coin, and the parable of the prodigal son, (or more accurately, the parable of the father with two sons). In my sermon I will be looking at each of these parables in order.
