


The Sunday Mass is broadcast via Zoom from Fernie & Sparwood (see below).

Just two things in this week's e-mail, firstly something to read before our weekend Masses, and then news about what is happening in the parish over the next number of weeks, but for some reason, it still runs to seven pages – it must be all the poems!



Thirsting

This Sunday we start reading the first of three of the longer passages from John's gospel. It is the wonderful story of the woman at the well. The story starts with,

When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink."

When she questions Jesus and asks why he, a Jew, is asking a Samaritan for a drink, we get these wonderful words from Jesus,


"If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink', you would have been the one to ask,

and he would have given you living water."

This was very much in my mind when I was listening to Fr. Mark's Lenten talk today (Thursday), and when he mentioned - possibly just in passing - about people's reaction to Jesus. Fr. Mark pointed out that in some of the great epic films about Jesus, as Jesus staggers towards Calvary, there is always a baying

crowd throwing their insults and anger at Christ. But Fr. Mark speculated whether in fact many of those who lived in Jerusalem at that time would have had little or no interest in what was going on, and Christ's passion could have been a tragically sad scene with only a few onlookers.

Move forward two thousand years and in our modern society we can see that there are some who are very hostile towards the Church, particularly the Catholic Church, and towards religion in general. Yet for ever increasing numbers in Canada, the Church and religion are of no interest, and so our faith doesn't provoke anger but rather apathy; people don't see that Christianity has any thing to offer them.



This story of the woman at the well is of such importance to us as Christians as it goes to a basic truth: that unless we recognise our thirst we will not see our need to come to the water. It is because people don't recognise their thirst that so many in our world aren't aware of their own need for what God is offering.

So is there less *thirst* in our society or less *awareness* of that thirst? I would say that the thirst is great but because so many other things are trying to fulfil people, we don't recognise our thirst. I could make a list including the suicide rate of young people, the prevalence of cannabis stores in every community and so many other signs that say people are seeking – *people are thirsting* – but they don't recognise either the nature of that yearning or what will answer that desire.

And while we lament that our world is going in this direction, the real question for each one of us – *particularly during Lent* – is do we recognise *our own* thirst, and recognise that Jesus is the only way that our real thirst will be quenched. As Jesus said – *indeed he cried out* – while he was in Jerusalem,

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"Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink.

As the scripture has said,
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'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.'' (John 7:37-38) John the Evangelist goes on to tell us that Jesus *"said this about the Spirit"*.

So often we can forget our thirst, we forget our need to come back to the living waters that flow from Christ, the living water of the Spirit. Or perhaps as Christians we have intellectually decided to believe in Christ, we go through the motions and say the right prayers but yet we don't cultivate that relationship with God that enables the water of life to well up in us. Knowing our need for God, knowing only God can be God, and thirsting for that reality must be central to us.

If you get a chance before the weekend Masses, please just take a few moments to quietly read and reflect upon Psalm 42 below. And as you reflect ask God to help you both recognise your thirst and recognise that the more we work on having a living relationship with God, the more we will be able to drink deeply from the wellsprings of salvation.

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Like the deer that yearns for running streams,
so my soul is yearning for you, my God.

My soul is thirsting for God, the God of my life;
when can I enter and see the face of God?

My tears have become my bread, by night, by day,
as I hear it said all the day long: "Where is your God?"

These things will I remember as I pour out my soul:
how I would lead the rejoicing crowd into the house of God,
amid cries of gladness and thanksgiving, the throng wild with joy.


Why are you cast down, my soul, why groan within me?

Lent Talks

What a great talk we had this week by Fr. Mark! I knew he'd be good. It brought up so many thoughts in my mind, but I fear thoughts more about poetry and how we use different genres rather than thinking about the scourging of Christ.

Right at the start of his talk Fr. Mark read a poem by an Anglican theologian, Nicola Slee. Nicola isn't exactly mainstream, and some people will find what she writes slightly shocking, and certainly, I would not want to align myself with many of the things she writes (indeed, I might want to actively distance myself from them!) But having said all that, I was very moved by the poem that Fr. Mark read. I am sure that we can discuss the theology of Mary's sinless state and what that meant in practice, but if we accept that Mary was a good, honest yet normal person, then I found this poem really said something I have not heard said before; in it Mary is portrayed with a humanity that we don't often think about.

(Fr. Mark did not want to put the poem on the screen during his talk as the talk will be uploaded to YouTube, and they have rules about copyright, so similarly I won't include it in this version of the weekly e-mail that is put on the website, but it is in the version sent out to individuals.)




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
