# Welcome

First Reading: Isaiah 56:1, 6-7 Second Reading: Romans 11:13-15, 29-32 Gospel: Matthew 15:21-28 Psalm 67

'Let the people praise you, O God, let all the people praise you.'

"Woman, great is your faith! Let it be for you as you desire." - Matthew 15:28

#### Faith of the Canaanite Woman: August 20, 2023

Isaiah 56: 1-7; Psalm 67: 2-8; Romans 11: 1-15; Matthew 15: 21-28

We have the incident of Jesus and the Canaanite women. She has a real need, and she cries out to him. But He refuses her request and compares her people as dogs, and says that he came only for the lost sheep of the House of Israel.

The best way to understand all this is to realize that the readings are speaking about the spread of faith. The reading from Romans refers to the many times that Paul visited various cities. When he visited a city, he preached to the Jews first. If they rejected the Gospel of Christ, Paul then preached to the gentiles. Often, the Jewish people were so inspired by the faith of the Gentiles that they were ready to accept Christianity. Experiencing the openness of gentiles' faith, led many of the Jews to embrace faith as the followers of Christ.

In the Gospel Jesus plays the role of the traditional Jews. To them, the Canaanite Woman would have no claim to the gifts God bestowed on the Jews. Jesus states this in his dialogue with her. But she still receives healing for her daughter. Why? Because she had faith in him. Faith is more powerful than ancestry. This passage in the Gospel occurs right after the passage where Jesus calls Peter a man of little faith. He tells his disciples that this gentile is a person of great faith.

Faith is a raging fire. It spreads from person to person. When we are exposed to a person of faith, our faith grows. As our faith grows, we ignite others with the fire of God's love. As others grow in faith, our faith increases. The Fire is the Fire of the Holy Spirit. Nothing can stop the flame. Nothing can stop the Spirit.

Let me give you an example: many of us are led to faith by our parents. We, in turn, lead our grandchildren to faith. We may teach them meal time or bedtime or morning or evening prayers. Experiencing the faith of their children, parents grow in faith. I am sure many of you have experienced this. Your faith brought others: children or friends to faith. Then their faith will grow us in a greater faith.

When it comes to the Fire of Faith, the Love of God, the Holy Spirit, we have got to allow God to be God and experience His Presence in the Sacraments and the Word of God. As a result, everything that we do and value in our lives will grow us and others in Faith with the same words of Jesus, "daughter, son, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish" (Mt. 15: 28) The Mercy of God is infinitely greater than people's concept of his mercy. Human beings put others in hell if they do not fit into their faith and concepts. In today's Gospel, human beings decided that since the Jews were the chosen people, Jesus should not bother with that Canaanite woman. "Send her away," the disciples said. St. Paul and others had to confront the fallacy that gentiles could not become better Christians than those Christians who had been fervent Jews. Through the grace of God, all of us are Christians following Jesus to the core of our hearts.

If we were to shut others out of our lives due to our own inflated self-worth, our own pride, we would deprive ourselves of being inflamed by the fire of God they have been given by the Holy and Merciful One. St. Paul teaches us, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free man, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3: 28). Jesus sees all that is good within the human heart. He saw the faith of the Canaanite woman. He sees your faith and my faith. He knows how we are trying our best to serve Him. How wonderful is that? He knows us better than we know ourselves. He Loves us more than we love ourselves. Faith leads to faith. O Woman of Cana, O gentile Christians, your great faith has led us to faith. May we have the humility to experience God's love in others and the grace to lead others to faith.

# **Finance Report**

#### Saint of the Week

St. Bernard of Clairvaux Feast Day: August 20



Bernard was born to a devout noble family in Burgandy, France in 1090 A.D.

He was pious as a boy and gifted intellectually, and in college he chose to study theology and Sacred Scripture.

He entered the Cistercians, then a new institute that was a reform of the Benedictines, and he inspired brothers and friends to enter after him. After taking vows his superiors recognized his sanctity and commissioned him to found a new monastery, which became known as the Abbey of Clairvaux.

He was widely recognized for his gifts and faith and was asked to become a bishop., but he declined each time.

He preached the second Crusade in France and Germany, encouraging all to embark on the holy mission. Unfortunately, his Crusade ended in failure, not due to St. Bernard, but due to the vices of some of the members of that Crusade.

St. Bernard died on August 20, 1153.

St. Bernard of Clairvaux was canonized on January 18, 1174, by Pope Alexander the III.
